Only Having Insurance Through Work Doesn't Work

Do you know anyone whose life or career has drastically changed during these years of economic downturn?

Students Place 58 Crosses To Remember 58-Million Babies Slaughtered By Abortion

HIGHLAND - Nineteen St. Paul eighth grade students, accompanied by their teachers Christina Harisberger and Stephanie Iberg, gave up part of their lunch hour on Friday, September 30, to install 58 crosses on the St. Paul East Lot to remember the babies who have been aborted.

Approximately 58-Million abortions have been performed in the United States since the Roe vs Wade law went into effect in 1973, which legalized abortion.

Leon Luber, a member of St. Paul Pro-Life Ministry and Pro-Life Director for the Knights of Columbus Council 1580, gave a few remarks on the significance of the crosses and the need to continue to work and pray to end abortions.

Luber thanked the students and teachers for their help, as well as Larry Korte, Terry Riffel, John Kapp, Ron and Rose Clarkin, Blake Kohlbrecher, Dale Triplett and Bill Napper for their help in organizing, preparing and conducting this program.

The crosses will be lit dusk to dawn all during the month of October.





Life Chain Calls Attention To Abortion



Life Chain Against Abortion

Holding signs and praying, people in Highland held a life-chain, Oct. 2. People all across the nation stood on sidewalks and near highways for 90 minutes with pro-life signs, protesting abortion and the Roe vs. Wade Supreme Court decision which allows abortion.

HIGHLAND - A good representation of people turned up here at the intersection of Route 143 and old 40 for the annual Life Chain on Sunday afternoon, October 2.

"This event is held throughout the United States and Canada to call attention to the horror of abortions and to ask everyone to pray to end this dark stain on our society," said Leon Luber, one of the participants.

Citizens held up signs from 2 to 3 p.m. asking for an end to abortion. The back of the signs give suggestions for prayers, who to pray for, and appropriate songs if the holder of the sign wishes to sing.

Participants stood silently, prayerful, and respectful.

Only their presence sent a message loud and strong that abortion provided by the landmark Supreme Court decision Roe vs. Wade should be overturned.
